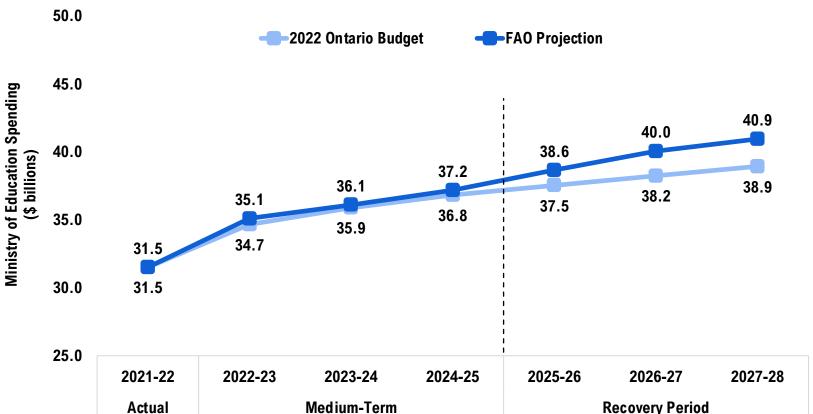






Projected Education Spending: FAO vs. Province

- FAO projects 4.5% growth rate vs. 3.6% growth rate in the 2022 budget.
- Overall, there is a cumulative \$6.0 billion funding gap or shortfall.

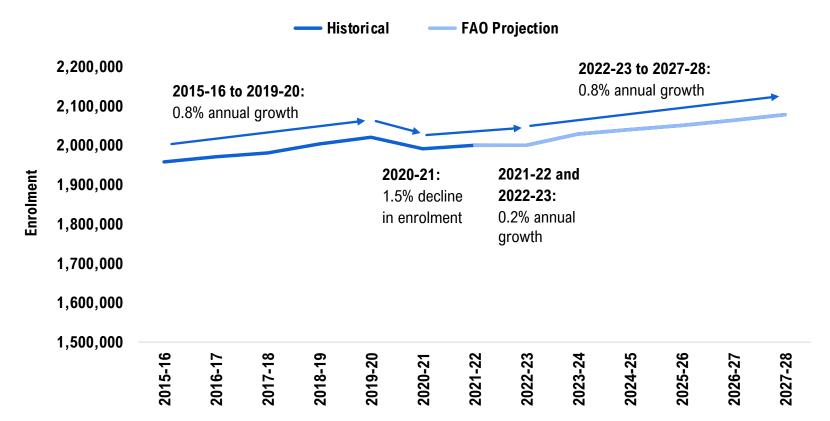






School Board Operations: Enrolment Expected to Return to Pre-Pandemic Growth

 Projected enrolment growth will lead to increase in school board workers from approximately 289,000 in 2021-22 to 300,000 in 2027-28.

School Board Operations: Wage Growth Assumptions

- As new collective agreements have not been reached, the FAO assumes wages will increase by 2.2% annually, reflecting the historical average.
- The FAO estimated the potential impact of two additional bargaining outcomes to its spending projection.

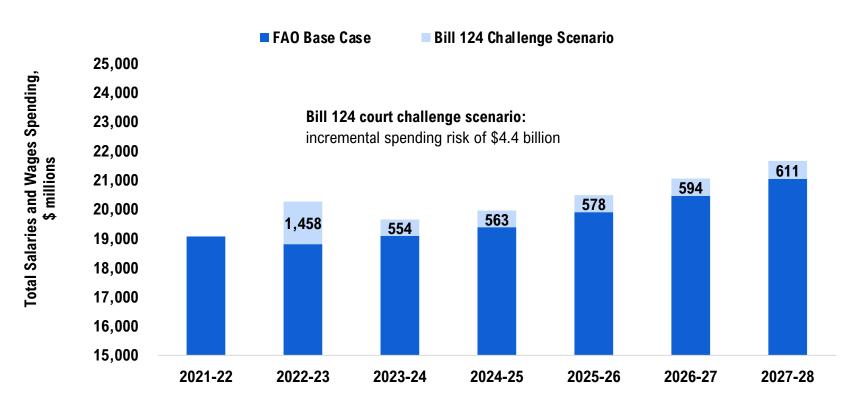

Risk to Compensation Spending Projection: the Court Challenge to Bill 124

 A successful court challenge to Bill 124 could increase spending on school board employee compensation by a cumulative \$4.4 billion over six years.



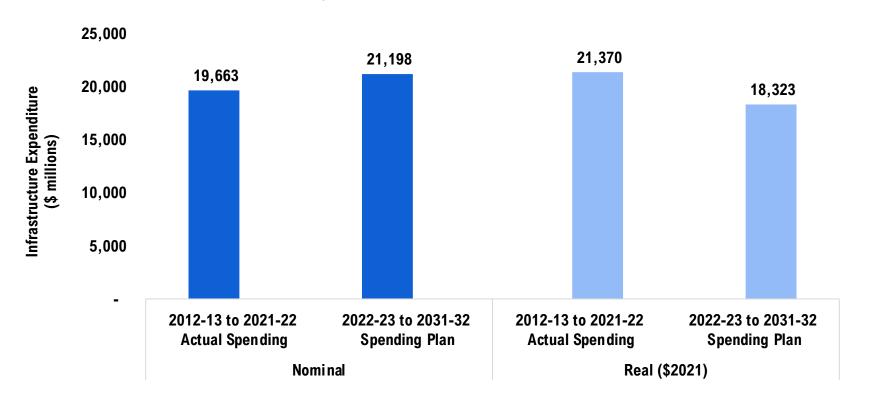

School Board Capital Spending to Decline in Real Terms

• Over the next 10 years, the ministry plans to invest more in school board infrastructure in nominal terms but \$3.0 billion (14 per cent) less in real terms (\$2021), when compared to the previous 10 years.

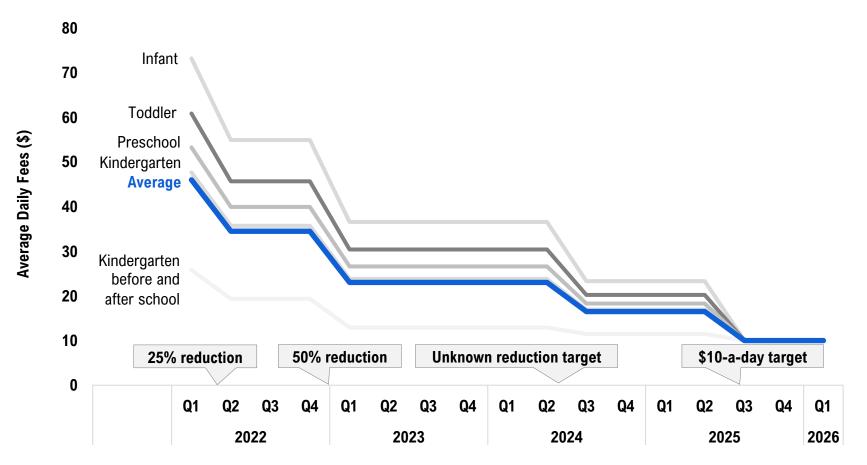








Targets to Achieve \$10-a-Day Child Care by September 2025

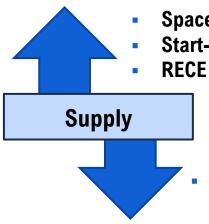

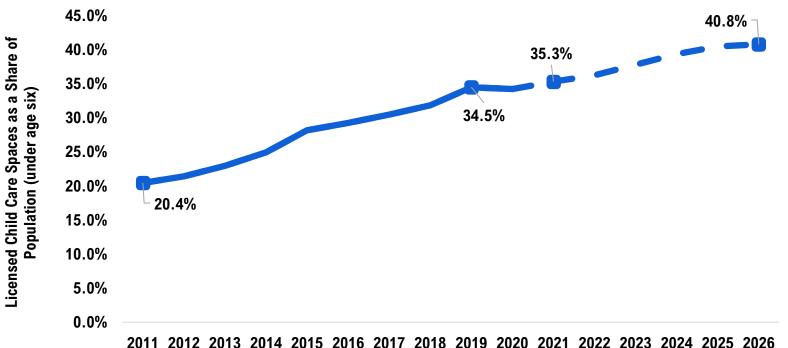






Licensed Child Care Spaces as Share of Population, 2011 to 2026

FAO projects the number of licensed child care spaces as a share of population for children under age six would increase to 40.8% by 2026.

How Many Child Care Providers will Enroll?

- The agreement has no target for the enrolment of child care providers.
- Enrolment is voluntary and there are reports of less than 100% uptake. In response, the Ministry extended the deadline to enrol and clarified program rules.
- Under the program, providers will not receive any more revenue for a given child;
 however, providers who do not enrol face a risk of operating below capacity.





























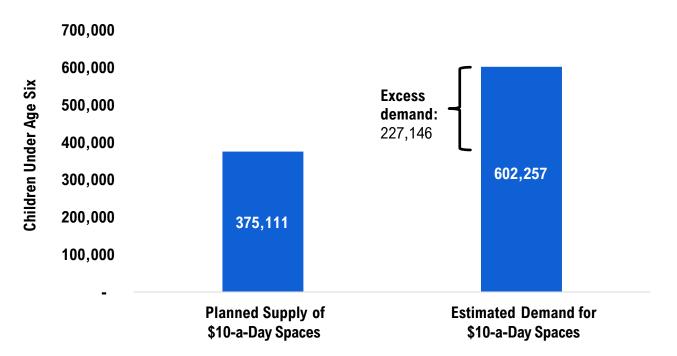






Demand for \$10-a-Day Child Care Expected to Exceed Supply

• With 375,111 licensed \$10-a-day child care spaces planned by 2026, the FAO estimates that families of 227,146 children will want but not be able to access \$10-a-day child care.

Will the Federal Government Continue to Fully **Fund the Program?**

- The Agreement ends in 2025-26.
- The federal and provincial governments have committed \$3.1 billion in 2026-27, leaving committed funding shortfalls of \$1.2 billion in 2026-27 and \$4.3 billion in 2027-28.
